For many years now, Franklin has struggled to recruit capable, dedicated people for our production environment. As a result, we've looked for new resources and new pools of people from which to draw. We've had some success with organizations like the Refuge, Goodwill and Salvation Army in finding the kind of people we seek. All of those organizations have helped people to recover from poor life decisions and patterns of behavior, and all of them fit well with our stated purpose. None has been even close to perfect, but we've recruited and retained some excellent people who have come through those organizations. At the same time, we've ruled out various other resources because they don't measure up to our standards. In the past vear. after careful consideration and examination of the vetting process used to select their people, we've added another resource/pool to our list: Kindway.

The Kindway Mission:

To invest in the lives of those impacted by incarceration.

This organization works with incarcerated men and women, sometimes for many years, as they approach the end of their incarceration, helping them to find new life and new purpose while also providing a framework of accountability. We've now hired five men who have graduated from Kindway's Embark program and have been released from prison. Some of those men, because of their crimes, committed decades ago in some cases, have caused concern among fellow employees. That concern is not unreasonable at first glance.

In fact, getting to know these men today would likely inspire anyone to want to know them better along with the source of their renewed life. I'm confident that you would be deeply moved by their sense of meaning and purpose, the gratitude they show for their jobs and most importantly the chance to represent someone bigger than themselves. Anyone who has a personal relationship with Jesus will be able to identify the source of these things. Anyone who hasn't vet come into such a relationship could be puzzled by the dramatic changes these men could describe and consistently demonstrate if given the chance. These men have new life today—life they couldn't possibly imagine when they committed their crimes. It's not just life on the outside of the prison walls that confined them. It's real life as their
